Legal Redress The Legal Redress committee acts as a liaison between clients (members) who have experienced discrimination in a work, civil, educational, or otherwise manner and the legal representatives that can take the case to trial. The Legal Redress Committee does not give legal advice or provide legal representation.	Political Action The Political Action Committee is responsible for educating the rest of the NAACP branch of policy changes at the local, state, and federal level. They disseminate information about politically charged situations and changes to the laws that govern the community. They stay on top of what city council, mayors, county commissioners, representatives, senators, and the president are looking to push out as new policies.
Education The Education Committee is the committee that seeks to eradicate racial-based discrimination within the local and state school systems. They also look to understand the curriculum that is being taught so that they can recognize and speak out on falsities that may be psychologically detrimental to minority students.	Economic Development The Economic Development Committee works to promote the economic well-being of minorities and disenfranchised individuals. They promote the businesses of minority, women, and people of color and help to encourage financial literacy and the understanding of economics.
Membership The Membership Committee is in charge of the recruitment of finding new members. Whether they be Lifetime, Annual payers, or Youth the Membership committee creates initiatives that will entice new members to want to take part in everything that the NAACP has to offer on a local and state level.	Criminal Justice The Committee on Criminal Justice seeks to eliminate harsh and unfair sentencing practices that are responsible for mass incarceration and racial disparities in the prison system, support and seek to increase trust and public safety by advancing effective law enforcement practices, and the removal of barriers to employment and elevate the voices of crime victims in order to identify and advance systemic breakdowns existing in the criminal justice system that perpetuate crime.
Youth Council The Youth Council committees oversee organizing the younger membership and keeping up the enthusiasm among the younger members of the Branch. They are also the group of individuals who will be "groomed" to be the next set of leadership	Labor and Industry Committee The Labor and Industry Committee attempts to improve the economic status of minority groups by working to eliminate discriminatory employment practices in industry and government, wage differentials based on race, unequal opportunities for training, promotion and unfair dismissals.

<p>Housing</p> <p>The housing Committee is tasked with fighting race-based discrimination in the housing industry. They are also in charge of finding and working with the affordable housing programs within local communities and the state as a whole. They are also well-versed in the laws surrounding housing and housing discrimination.</p>	<p>Communication, Publicity & Press</p> <p>The communications, Publicity, and Press committee is responsible for creating a positive narrative surrounding the NAACP. They foster healthy relationships with news and media outlets in the hopes that they will report credible and accurately about the things the NAACP is doing in the community.</p>
<p>Freedom Fund</p> <p>The Freedom Fund Committee is responsible for the majority of fund-raising for the branch and works very closely with the Finance Committee. They are also in charge of coordinating, organizing, and creating the Annual Freedom Fund banquet.</p>	<p>Health Committee</p> <p>The Health Committee works to promote, protect and maintain the health of African Americans, assesses the health needs of the community, advocates for equal access to health education, care, treatment and research for all Americans, sponsors health-related activities such as health forums, fairs and workshops, highlighting issues of importance to people of color, and supports health initiatives of the NAACP.</p>
